rom a humble 1,000 in numbers, it increased to 7,000 and this time round it went past the 10,000 mark. The growing number of participants also signifies the growing awareness of what the global 350 movement is about.

And this growing awareness is what Young NTUC has been looking forward to. Run 350 that took place in conjunction with Earth Day saw its third year running on 22 April 2012, and served as a platform congregating like-minded individuals who wanted to do their part for the environment.

Said NTUC Deputy Secretary-General Ong Ye Kung: "Every year the motivation is the same. There is this global movement that believe 350 parts per million (ppm) is the carbon intensity that we humans can live comfortably with.

"In fact, it's at 392ppm today, and I don't think that ever in human history have we lived with that kind of carbon intensity. The signs out there, people are debating, whether this is



About two weeks before the run, Young NTUC was already hard at work preparing for the actual race day itself. Over 45 Young NTUC volunteers, led by youth activist Lincoln Han, dedicated hours on their weekends from 6 to 8 April 2012 for the Race Pack Collection day.

A total of 9,010 came to collect their race packs, and while serving every participant, volunteers also had the opportunity to bond and make new friends. This was truly meaningful for many.

Shared Mr Han: "Everyone has a part to play in going green and staying healthy. As a runner, Run 350 offers me the unique opportunity to push through this message, be it by encouraging more people to volunteer their time to show concern for our environment, or achieving a healthy lifestyle through running."

Run 350's **Green Efforts**

Pre-Race

During the Race Pack Collection day, a paperless race pack collection measure was introduced and runners

were also requested to download their own e-Race Handbooks. Through this, at least 70,000 A4 sheets of paper, or emissions of 0.7 tonnes of CO2 equivalent have been saved.

Even when there was a need for printing to take place, Young NTUC also made it a point to ensure that its publicity materials for Run 350 were printed on Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) certified paper made from sustainable and recycled sources.

To minimise potential wastage on race day, race packs for the day were only filled with necessary items where most of the runners' entitlement are pre-packed inside the shoe bags. All cups and bottles that were used during the day was also sorted out and sent for

Runners were also encouraged to cycle to the event, where bicycle racks for up to 250 bicycles were provided. And to best serve the purpose of the run, Young NTUC also requested to use biodiesel instead of regular diesel to fuel the power generator powering
